

The Jews and the Romans

- Romans
 - held the final authority
 - the only power for capital punishment (death penalty)
 - Caesar: highest authority
 - Pilate: local authority
- Jews
 - under Roman authority could manage own affairs
 - Sanhedrin (chief priests, elders, teachers of the law):
 highest Jewish authority


Trials of Jesus

- 1. By Jews (Sanhedrin): religious power and theology (cp. 14)
 - Worst crime is Blasphemy:

claiming the authority/identity of God

- High priest to Jesus: "Are you the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One?"
- Jesus: "I am."
- 2. By Romans (Pilate): secular concerns (cp. 15)
 - Worst crime is Insurrection: violent rebellion
 - Chief priests to Pilate:
 He claims to be the king of the Jews.

Why didn't Jesus defend Himself?

Pilate ...asked Jesus, "Are you the king of the Jews?"...

Jesus said, "My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, my servants would fight to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now my kingdom is from another place."

John 18:33-36

- Jesus was not a political Messiah
- So He avoided the political interpretation (the "Messianic secret")
- The political interpretation is how they killed him

Why didn't Jesus defend Himself?

In chapter 14, Jesus prayed:

"Abba, Father," he said, "everything is possible for you.

Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will."

Mark 14:36

- He got the answer: God's will for Jesus was the cross
- So Jesus went forward without resistance

Why didn't Jesus defend Himself?

He was oppressed and afflicted,
yet he did not open his mouth;
he was led like a lamb to the slaughter,
and as a sheep before its shearers is silent,
so he did not open his mouth.


- 1: Jesus is handed over for Roman judgment

 - 15: Pilate gives in and condemns Jesus to flogging and crucifixion


Flogging = whipping someone with leather straps that include bits of bone and lead

Implications

1. Delight in this great love of God!

We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We <u>implore</u> you on Christ's behalf: Be <u>reconciled</u> to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

2 Corinthians 5:20-21

Implore = beg earnestly
Reconciled = restored relationship, friendship

Implications

- 1. Delight in this great love of God!
- 2. Willingly take the road of suffering, persecution, mistreatment, and accusation as we follow Jesus

But if you suffer for doing good and you endure it, this is <u>commendable</u> before God. To this you were called, because **Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps**.

"He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." When they hurled their insults at him, he did not retaliate; when he suffered, he made no threats. Instead, he entrusted himself to him who judges justly.
