Scripture: Psalm 73 "Awakening to Reality"

Reading & Discussing Scripture

- **Read the verses from Psalm 73:12-16:** Asaph said that, without looking at the final destination of the two different roads in life, he found the comparison between God's path and the path of people who were far from God to be deeply troubling. What was troubling to him?
- Read Psalm 73:17, 19, 23-24: Asaph said that when he "saw the final destiny" of the road that is apart from God, he was no longer troubled. What is the critical difference between the destinations of the two roads that Asaph was able to see?



- Read Matthew 7:13-14: How did Jesus describe the difference between the two roads?
- **Read John 14:21 and Isaiah 59:1-3**: The first passage seems to describe the narrow road, and the second passage seems to describe the broad road. What do these passages say about the people who are on each of these roads? Note that "partial goodness" and "partial loyalty" fit within Isaiah's description of the people who are separated from God.
- **Read Colossians 1:21-23:** When we are on the broad road, Isaiah said that we are separated and alienated from God. How does Colossians describe the change from being an enemy of God to being reconciled to God, in other words, to be loved by God as His child? How is the death of Jesus a good thing?

The Big Idea

The death of Jesus Christ is the only true hope for eternal life with God

Application & Reflection Questions

- Since the cross is naturally a symbol of torture and death for guilty people, why does Paul say that it is His boast? (see Galatians 6:14)
- Once you have taken the narrow road of the cross of Jesus Christ and His death for you, there is no more place for pride, fear, and (self) judgment. What draws you back into the place of pride, fear, and (self) judgment?
- When you are back in the place of pride, fear, and (self) judgment, what helps you see clearly again the amazing love of God for us expressed in the death of Jesus Christ?
- We are "to proclaim the Lord's death until He comes." (1 Corinthians 11:26) Whom can you tell of this amazing news, that our hope is not in ourselves, but in the immensity of the love enacted God for us in Jesus Christ's death on the cross?

Growing in Cultural Understanding

In Jesus' day, the cross was a symbol of shame, torture, and death. So when Paul said, "May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ," it was a startling statement. For you, what symbol might evoke feelings or thoughts similar to what "cross" brought in that day? How might it change your sense of Paul's words if we substituted that symbol in Paul's statement of boasting in the cross?

Serving beyond ourselves

New International Version (NIV)

Psalm 73:12-16

This is what the wicked are like always free of care, they go on amassing wealth.
Surely in vain I have kept my heart pure and have washed my hands in innocence.
All day long I have been afflicted, and every morning brings new punishments.
If I had spoken out like that, I would have betrayed your children.
When I tried to understand all this, it troubled me deeply.
