Scripture: Hebrews 11:8-10. Sermon: "Designed and Built by God"

Reading & Discussing Scripture

- 1. How could hope for something in the future ruin how we live today? How could our current experience today ruin our hope for the future?
- 2. **Overview.** Our church celebrates the Lord's Table once a month. We focus on different emphases of the Gospel each time. Last Sunday we focused on heaven: the hope of the perfect Kingdom restored. To learn more ab out the Christian hope of heaven, we studied the story of Abraham, who lived with great faith and action in relationship with God as he looked forward to fully experiencing God's promises.
- 3. **Background:** The story of Abraham is the beginning of God's specific plan of rescuing humanity. God commanded Abraham to go to a new land (Israel) that God promised to give to his descendants, but not Abraham himself. Abraham believed and went, but never owned any land ...except a burial plot. His son Isaac and grandson Jacob lived the same way. After that, the family lived 400 years as strangers, even slaves, in a foreign land (Egypt). God eventually brought them back to the Land of Promise 500 years after the promise was given. The writer of Hebrews draws lessons from his life of faith...
- 4. **Read Hebrews 11:8-10**. Compare Abraham's actual experience with what he hoped for. What are the characteristics of "tents"? What are the characteristics of a "city with foundations", especially a city whose "architect and builder is God?" How is Abraham's journey of faith similar to a Christian's experience? What encouragement can we take from Abraham's story?
- 5. Read Revelation 21:2-3. How does this vision of heaven strengthen your hope today?
- 6. **Read Colossians 1:3-6.** Do you experience what the Colossian Christians experienced: that your "faith and love spring from the hope stored up for you in heaven"? Why or why not?
- 7. Do you have any other questions about the passage or the sermon?

The Big Idea

God's promises for our glorious future of living with God lead us to life-filled anticipation today

Two errors Christians can make...

1) Hope for tomorrow makes us stop living today...

Making effort to grow as Christians. Valuing God's wonderful creation. Courageously loving all people 2) Today makes us stop hoping for tomorrow...

If today seems bad, we can be afraid to hope. If today seems good, why hope for Christ's return?

Application & Reflection Questions

- 8. When are you tempted to stop genuine and enthusiastic living in this life?
- 9. When are you tempted to stop hoping for our life forever with God?
- 10. How is the hope of our glorious future in Christ and the new heaven and new earth shaping your life today?
- 11. Where do you tend to see just brokenness instead of God's promises to bring great glory in it? How can fellow life group members or others in your life help you live today based on that future glory?

Growing in Cultural Understanding

Christians, like Abraham, are called to live meaningfully as foreigners on this earth as we wait eagerly for the promises of heaven. Sometimes we experience being foreign because of the passport we carry. Sometimes we experience it because of a disconnect between our life experience and our values from the culture and expectations around us. How much, and in what ways, have you experienced living as a foreigner? How has that affected you? Who else in your life has experienced this or is experiencing it, whether in deeper or lesser ways than you? How can you encourage them? How can you learn from them? And how can these things help you better understand the Christian journey?

Abraham's faith in action

⁸ By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. ⁹By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. ¹⁰For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

²I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Look!
