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Persecution

Overview of Acts 21-28

Paul was arrested in Jerusalem (Judea)

- Jewish leaders were upset with Paul
 - Paul's claim that Jewish traditions were no longer necessary
 - Paul including Gentiles among Jewish people
- They accused him of crimes before Roman rulers

Paul "appealed to Caesar" to try to get justice

Paul had just arrived in Rome as a prisoner after a 4-month journey that almost took his life

Acts 28:17-22

Three days later he **called together the local Jewish leaders**. When they had assembled, Paul said to them: "**My brothers**, although I have done nothing against our people or against the customs of our ancestors, I was arrested in Jerusalem and handed over to the Romans. They examined me and wanted to release me, because I was not guilty of any crime deserving death. The Jews objected, so I was compelled to make an appeal to Caesar. I certainly did not intend to bring any charge against **my own people**. For this reason I have **asked** to see you and talk with you. It is because of the **hope of Israel** that I am bound with this chain."

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Acts 28:17-22

They replied, "We have not received any letters from Judea concerning you, and none of our people who have come from there has reported or said anything bad about you. But **we want to hear** what your views are, for we know that people **everywhere are talking against this sect**."



Acts 28:23-29

They arranged to meet Paul on a certain day, and came in even larger numbers to the place where he was staying. He witnessed to them from morning till evening, explaining about the kingdom of God, and from the Law of Moses and from the Prophets he tried to persuade them about Jesus. Some were convinced by what he said, but others would not believe. They disagreed among themselves and began to leave after Paul had made this final statement: "The Holy Spirit spoke the truth to your ancestors when he said through Isaiah the prophet:

| "Go to this people and say, |
| "You will be ever hearing but never understanding; |
| you will be ever seeing but never perceiving." |
| For this people's heart has become calloused ; |
| they hardly hear with their ears , |
| and they have closed their eyes . |
| Otherwise they might see with their eyes , |
| hear with their ears , |
| understand with their hearts |
| and turn , and I would heal them.' |
| "Therefore I want you to know that God's salvation has been |
| sent to the Gentiles, and they will listen!" |
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Acts 28:30-31

For two whole years Paul stayed there in his own rented house and welcomed all who came to see him. He **proclaimed** the **kingdom of God** and **taught** about the **Lord Jesus Christ** —with **all boldness** and **without hindrance**!



Big Idea

The Good News of Jesus Christ will grow and go to all peoples until the end of this age

By the Spirit and power of God

Even through human and supernatural opposition and failings

- This is the big idea of all of Acts
- With all boldness and without hindrance





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Paul said: "Remember Jesus Christ, **raised** from the **dead**, descended from David. This is my gospel, for which **I am suffering** even to the point of being **chained like a criminal**. But **God's word is not chained**."

2 Timothy 2:8-9, perhaps during a later imprisonment leading to his death

- This is the exact ending of Acts
 - Christian witnesses in chains, yet the Gospel going out
 - And that is victory!

• This is the Church

- Not a martyr complex: self-pity
- Not triumphalistic expectation: expect all blessing
- Not foolish, sloppy living
- Rather: Realistic optimism & skillful, faith-filled godliness

Big Idea

The Good News of Jesus Christ will grow and go to all peoples until the end of this age





Boldly: Proclaim the Kingdom of God and Jesus **Without hindrance:** No matter the challenges

- Be confident in God and His Gospel by the Spirit
 - Focus on the power, not the problems
 - -Not naïve or blind faith
 - -Rather: focus on

the immeasurable power and glory of God

- Nothing can stop the Gospel!
 - It may take twists and turns
 - There may be dark days





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"What about when the Church seems to be making so little progress?"

"And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the <u>gates of Hades</u> will not



overcome it." *Matthew 16:18* gates of Hades = Satan's opposition

"And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." *Romans 8:28*

It might look and feel like we are going backwards, yet **nothing can stop** the work of God to build His church
